AN UPDATE FROM RADIO PATROL

The pandemic hit us hard as our organization was one of the functions shut down by the governor's orders. We are now authorized to return to patrol, but we are only going to operate with our driver and observer being from the same (bubble, pod, household). If you are feeling homebound, consider signing up for patrol with a member of your household. As you patrol with someone not a health risk for you, know that we have otherwise contact-free arrangements for our patrollers. If a teen 16 or older needs service hours, and wants to patrol with a parent, that's also possible. Call 313-862-3754 to reach us until we are back in full service.

The neighborhood has remained relatively quiet through the pandemic. With the exception of one assault with an arrest now reported, reports of crimes—official and anecdotal—are typical, and possibly trending lower. Nationwide, concerns about domestic disturbances continue. We have some resources to recommend, if you are aware of a problem.

As we prepare for winter, we want to remind everyone to check one of the really important safety issues which can affect us household by household. An increasing number of neighbors risk their safety by not having their house numbers clearly visible from the street...not on the house, not on a yard sign. Some are too small, too low in contrast, or worse yet, not there at all! ("Painted on the curb" doesn't work with parked cars, fallen leaves, or snow!) When first responders have to slow down to find your address, you lose. Another increasing problem is parking in front of fire hydrants. Hydrants also must be kept clear of leaf bags and other yard waste, and later, deep snow.

University District Radio Patrol hopes to be back in full operation before too much longer. In the meantime, even if our service hours remain reduced, we are able to assist with some issues. Again, reach us currently at 313-862-3754. Please leave a message if we don't answer promptly. Don't forget that the other, subscriber supported. University District Patrol remains on the road. And if the Special Assessment District initiative passes, we will be seeing a lot more of that patrol's service. Be of good health, neighbors!

BACK TO SCHOOL DURING COVID



SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT PETITION DRIVE UPDATE

We are nearing the number of signatures required to implement a Special Assessment District for the University District. For new community members not familiar with special assessment districts: six years ago the Detroit City Council passed an ordinance intended to strengthen Detroit neighborhoods by empowering neighborhoods to provide supplemental listed services of:



SECURITY



**SNOW
REMOVAL**



**MOSQUITO
ABATEMENT**

These services are paid for by a \$175 annual fee assessed by the City but managed by the neighborhood. The UDCA's Special Assessment Committee will manage the assessment and its funds and services. This committee will be responsible for vetting contractors, contracting the services, maintaining financial records, and any other aspects of the program. Annual operating / financial reports will be provided to all residents.

51% or more of the homeowners in a neighborhood need to sign the petition to become a Special Assessment District, and we are nearly **75%** of the way to our goal when the COVID pandemic hit.

Between now and the end of the year, we will make a final push to secure the signatures and finish the petition drive. We will staff a table at both polling locations for the November 3 election. Please stop by and add your signature to the petition. We'll have hand sanitizer and will be wearing masks.

The SAD petition also makes house calls. If you'd like to sign before the November election, please send an email to signmeup@detmi.net and someone will contact you regarding scheduling a time for the petition to stop by your house.

SEEKING CANDIDATES

The UDCA board is seeking candidates and/or nominations for five board vacancies for the term of January 2021 through December 2023. Ballots will be distributed to UDCA paid members in November.

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible to run and sit on the board, a resident must be a current paid member of the University District Community Association and remain a paid member throughout the three-year term.

REQUIREMENTS

Board members attend a monthly meeting and the semi-annual General Membership meetings, vote on issues, attend UDCA-sponsored social functions, serve on at least one committee and report on activities as required, and represent the Board to the community. Board members are also encouraged to submit articles to the newsletter.

THE VOTING PROCESS

Residents who are paid UDCA members will receive ballots in early November. Ballots must be returned by the due date noted on the ballots. The votes will be tallied, and newly elected board members will be notified and announced at the Annual General Membership meeting, currently scheduled for December.

THE UDCA BOARD

The purpose of the UDCA Board is to:

- ✔ Maintain and support the neighborhood integrity
- ✔ Promote active partnership and membership
- ✔ Coordinate cultural and family events
- ✔ Maintain and enforce zoning ordinances and equitable tax assessments related to the use of property in the District
- ✔ Promote and monitor public improvements
- ✔ Facilitate regular communications among the members
- ✔ Represent the District concerning property taxes, levies, and other property issues
- ✔ Represent the District in legislative matters with City & State agencies.

One third (5) of the Board members' terms expire each year. This ensures that stability and consistency on the Board are maintained while assuring the opportunity for an infusion of "new blood".

Still not sure? Well, don't decide just yet. Talk to a current or former Board member! Participate in upcoming UDCA activities. Come to a monthly Board meeting (on Zoom) and see just how well you'd fit in. Remember, together we can do anything. Just take your seat!

NOVEMBER 2020 ELECTION INFO

2020 has been an unprecedented year. Never in a million years did any of us think on January 1 that the terms “coronavirus”, “pandemic” and “civil unrest” would be so prevalent in our everyday conversations; yet, here we are.

While voting is a civic duty no person should ever take for granted, the 2020 election is likely the most important election cycle of our lives. We are at a crossroads in our country and one of the ways we can effect change and have a lasting positive impact on our community, city, state, and country is through voting.

As a non-profit organization, the UDCA cannot and will not tell you for whom to vote. But, we will stress the importance of voting and will do our part to make sure your vote is counted. Below you will find information about voter registration, your polling location, absentee voting, and ways to get involved.

VOTER REGISTRATION

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS - MUST BE:

1. 18 years of age or older (at the time you vote);
2. A Michigan resident and a resident of the city in which you plan to vote for at least 30 days at the time you vote;
3. A US citizen; and
4. Not currently serving a jail or prison sentence

If registering within two weeks of the election, you will be required to provide proof of residency by providing a copy of your:

1. Michigan driver’s license or state identification with current address;
2. Current utility bill with current address;
3. Bank statement with current address;
4. Paycheck or government check with current address;
5. Other government document with current address

You can register to vote prior to Election Day

1. Online at <https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/RegisterVoter/Index>;
2. In-person at a Secretary of State branch office;
3. In-person at the Detroit Department of Elections, 2978 West Grand Boulevard, Detroit, MI 48202, or
4. By mailing your application to Detroit Department of Elections, 2978 West Grand Boulevard, Detroit, MI 48202 (must be postmarked no later than October 19)

You can register to vote on Election Day at the Detroit Department of Elections, 2978 West Grand Boulevard, Detroit, MI 48202. Be sure to bring proof of residency with you to the Clerk’s Office (see above).

WHY? WELL.....ACCORDING TO THE US DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION'S NHTSA:



2,967
FATALITIES
EACH YEAR

- There is an average of 2,967 fatalities each year due to stop sign accidents. That is slightly more than 20% of all traffic fatalities each year. About 45% were failure-to-obey crashes, and 48% were failure-to-yield incidents.
- One-third of all intersection crashes in the United States occur at stop sign controlled intersections - approximately 70,000 crashes annually.
- More than 40% of fatal crashes that take place each year happen at stop sign intersections.
- More than 50% of the combined total of fatal and injury crashes occur at or near intersections.
- For more than two decades, speeding has been involved in approximately one-third of all motor vehicle fatalities. In 2017, speeding was a contributing factor in 26% of all traffic fatalities. There were 9,378 speeding related fatalities in 2018.

The speed limit in the UD is 25 mph. Each intersection within the UD is a four way stop. {Sign, Sign Everywhere a Sign.} Why? Because these measures save lives, reduce injuries and property damage. Yes, a slow driver can have an accident. And a sign will not prevent all accidents. It will not prevent any, if we do not obey the sign. STOP, PLEASE! Save a life. Maybe one of my toddler granddaughters'. Thanks.

LET (UDP'S) MIKE DO IT!

Sure, you can do it yourself, but why? Cut your own lawn, shovel/plow your own snow, trouble shoot your Wi-Fi, etc. At some point, we decide to let experts provide some of these services for us. It's more convenient, and we have lots of other things to do.

You have a monitored home alarm, doorbell cameras, car alarms, personal protection, dead bolt locks, neighbors who look out for you, and 911! You have layers of security, and each one is great at what it does. There is one more layer of security you can have here in the UD. Our University District Patrol (UDP), featuring our regular patrol officer, Mike, is one of the services.

Why pay someone else for this service? Sure, you can:

- confront that knucklehead window shopping in your backyard or checking to see if the cars in your driveway are unlocked
- go outside and ask that stranger going door to door, ringing doorbells, and looking in windows at 11pm, what they want
- drive through the neighborhood looking for the perp that just tried to break into your car
- Call DPD (Detroit Police Department) and wait

You cannot do any of these when you are on vacation or just away from home. You do not want to do them when you're sleep in your bed.

Why do them when Mike can do it for you? Hear a noise? See a suspicious character? Stay in the bed, finish dinner, finish that Disney+ stream. Don't rush home from a night out.

Just call Mike and let him check it out. Send him a video from your doorbell cam so he'll know who to look for. The Patrol is awake when you're asleep, here when you're away from home, even on vacation.

Some of us say: "If the knucklehead dares to break into my house, I know he'll be sorry." Because "I got this!" We know you do. But why deal with him? Why bother? Why hassle? Let's deter him/her from ever getting to your house. Let Mike do it!

Most importantly, the Patrol is a deterrent. A visible presence to those looking for opportunity. Being lazy by nature, the knuckleheads will go where they're less likely to be seen and confronted. The fewer of them walking or driving through the UD while you're strolling with family, jogging, bike riding, the better.

COVID-19 PREVENTION TIPS



Throughout this pandemic, the Detroit Health Department is committed to ensuring the health and well-being of residents, visitors and animals in our care. Help slow the spread of COVID-19 in our community by following these tips.

1. Stay home if you are sick.
2. When coughing or sneezing, cover your mouth with your sleeve or a tissue.
3. Wash hands frequently with warm soapy water for at least 20 seconds.
4. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth.
5. If you are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms, call your doctor immediately.
6. Regularly clean frequently used surfaces, and objects, like door knobs, TV remotes, light switches, cell phones, etc.
7. Stay home unless going out for work, to pick up food or medicine, or to care for someone else.
8. If directed by a doctor to home-quarantine, separate yourself from others, use a mask or cloth to cover your nose and mouth, and regularly clean your bathroom and all items you touch.
9. When in public, at work, or around someone who is sick, always cover your nose and mouth with a mask or basic facial covering.
10. Try to remain at least six feet from others when at work, in public, or around those who may be sick.


