



## Make an impact JOIN THE BOARD

The University District Community Association (UDCA) Board is seeking candidates interested in fulfilling the mission of the Board for a 3-year term that begins in 2025. One third (5) of the Board members' terms expire each year to ensure that stability and consistency on the Board is maintained while providing the opportunity for inclusion of new members and perspectives.

To be eligible to run and serve on the Board, a resident must be a current paid member of the UDCA and remain a paid member throughout the three-year term. Board members attend a monthly meeting and the semi-annual General Membership meetings, vote on issues, attend UDCA-sponsored social functions, serve on at least one committee and report on activities as required, and represent the Board to the community. Board members are also encouraged to submit articles to the newsletter. Service entails approximately 5 hours per month from each Board member.

Applications are due by September 30, 2024.



At soon to be 91 years old, Bobbie Johnson has been a beloved fixture in our community for over 50 years. Her University District journey began in 1970 when she, her husband, and their five children moved to the neighborhood.

Bobbie's early years were marked by her dedication to both education and music. She started her teaching career in her hometown of Grand Rapids and then later in Detroit as a Special Education teacher at Detroit Public Schools and taught piano lessons on the side. Her musical influence and encouragement can be seen in her family members, with several of her children and grandchildren becoming professional musicians, artists, writers, athletes, and entrepreneurs as adults.

Throughout her life, Bobbie's home has held profound significance for her family. Affectionately calling it a "revolving door," she recalls a constant flow of friends and family who have called it home over the years, "They were always welcome here, and I love that they felt at home and safe."

The walls of her home are filled with artwork. Her collection began with pieces from her brother and world-renowned realist painter, Paul Collins, and now has grown to feature works from her many artist children and grandchildren. This collection symbolizes her and her family's artistic legacy and her nurturing and creative spirit.



One of Bobbie's greatest joys has been the diverse and vibrant community around her. She values the mix of all ages, races, and beliefs that characterize her neighborhood. Her enduring love for her home and the relationships she has built reflect a rich, fulfilling life that continues to inspire those around her.

George splits his time between Los Angeles and Detroit, working as a freelance technical director in the live sports broadcast industry. He spends much of his workday directing cameras for live NFL, PGA, and NCAA events and has earned several Emmy Awards for Technical Directing. Although he often works in LA, Detroit has always felt like home, as George grew up in SE Michigan.

Khayman, originally from Cincinnati, moved to SE Michigan with his family at 17 and attended Wayne State University. He now works as a K-12 art teacher at DPSCD. Khayman enjoys painting and constantly picks up new art skills like watercolor, ceramics,

and recently, crocheting, to teach his students. After recent crochet classes, his students received an invitation to showcase their work at the DIA's Student Exhibition.

George and Khayman love the strong sense of community in the University District and the camaraderie that comes from maintaining an historic home. "I love the ability to bring revitalization to the city we love by investing in it ourselves," George shared.



A Matching Gift Program is a type of corporate philanthropy. Please ask the organization you work/worked for if they have a charitable matching gift program. If so, you can double your financial support to UDCA and other 501c3 nonprofits. For example, if you are an employee or retiree that pays \$60 to UDCA for a membership, and your employer offers a Matching Gift Program, the employer's \$60 matching gift goes straight from them to UDCA to support our neighborhood events and meetings. We thank them, and acknowledge you, for the gift.

Some employers, such as Bank of America, Ford Motor Company, General Motors, and Rocket Companies, also offer a Volunteer Grants program that gives money to nonprofit organizations where the employees volunteer their time. The process of asking for the grant is usually easy and online.

This tea and coffee house is still in its soft-opening phase, but it's already attracting quite a buzz for its charm and comfy atmosphere. Go for its wide variety of teas, sandwiches or variety of home-made pastries. But leave your devices at home.

Owner Kimberly Elise, a certified tea sommelier, grew up enjoying high tea with her mother. Discouraged that there were few places to enjoy a good cup of tea, she decided to open her own place after training that took her to seven states and London.

"Tea is warm, comforting and it reminds me of home," says Elise, a native Detroiter. "It's also social. You sit alone or sit around with friends or loved ones and enjoy a good conversation."

In fact, this authentic French café is a WiFi-free zone, to encourage the increasingly lost art of conversation. So, go to connect with people, not your devices.

Eventually, it was too much stuff to keep in their home so they opened their shop to offer vintage architectural salvage goods on a sliding scale price point.

The couple still scrounges around for goods, but as word gets around, people have also begun donating items. They don't buy items, because at this point the business makes just enough to cover rent and utilities on the building that's a short drive from the couples' home in the Dexter/Linwood community.

Sometimes getting laid off is a good thing. That was when Lynn Warren took a cake decorating class and had plenty of time to perfect her talent. One thing led to another and a cake business that she started from home grew into You Baking Me Crazy.

The shop offers a variety of pound cakes, including a vegan pound cake and margarita pound cake, an assortment of cupcakes, mini sweet potato pies, peach cobbler and more. Plus, it offers candied apples, an assortment of sandwiches and an ice-cream shop with 16 different flavors of handpacked ice-cream from the popular Ray's Ice Cream in Royal Oak.

Warren, who opened the shop with husband, Andre Warren, lives in nearby Green Acres. She said she began cooking and baking in middle school, and, when growing up she was the main cook for four younger brothers.

Wood and lumber (bundle and remove nails, screws and staples)

Cabinets (remove doors)

Carpet and padding (bundle

and remove staples and nails)

Toilets

Paneling (bundle or place in contractor bags, remove nails and screws)

Tile (in contractor bags)

Drywall (in contractor bags)

Each item, bag and bundle must weigh less than 50 lbs.




#### NOT ACCEPTED

Concrete, brick, asphalt and shingles


Tires and other auto parts Metal poles and pipes
